Sailing Tips

"When in Doubt, Let It Out".

The most common mistake sailors make when trimming sails is to pull them in too far. This is especially harmful after tacks, when all boats need some time to accelerate with eased sails before they're brought back on a close-hauled course. If the boat feels sluggish and is heeling over too far, let the traveler out a few inches and ease the jib sheet slightly. You won't be able to point quite as high, but she'll be making much better use of the wind and sailing faster.


According to the website SailboatsToGo.com it can be equipped with a bolt-on sail upgrade.
